# System Overview

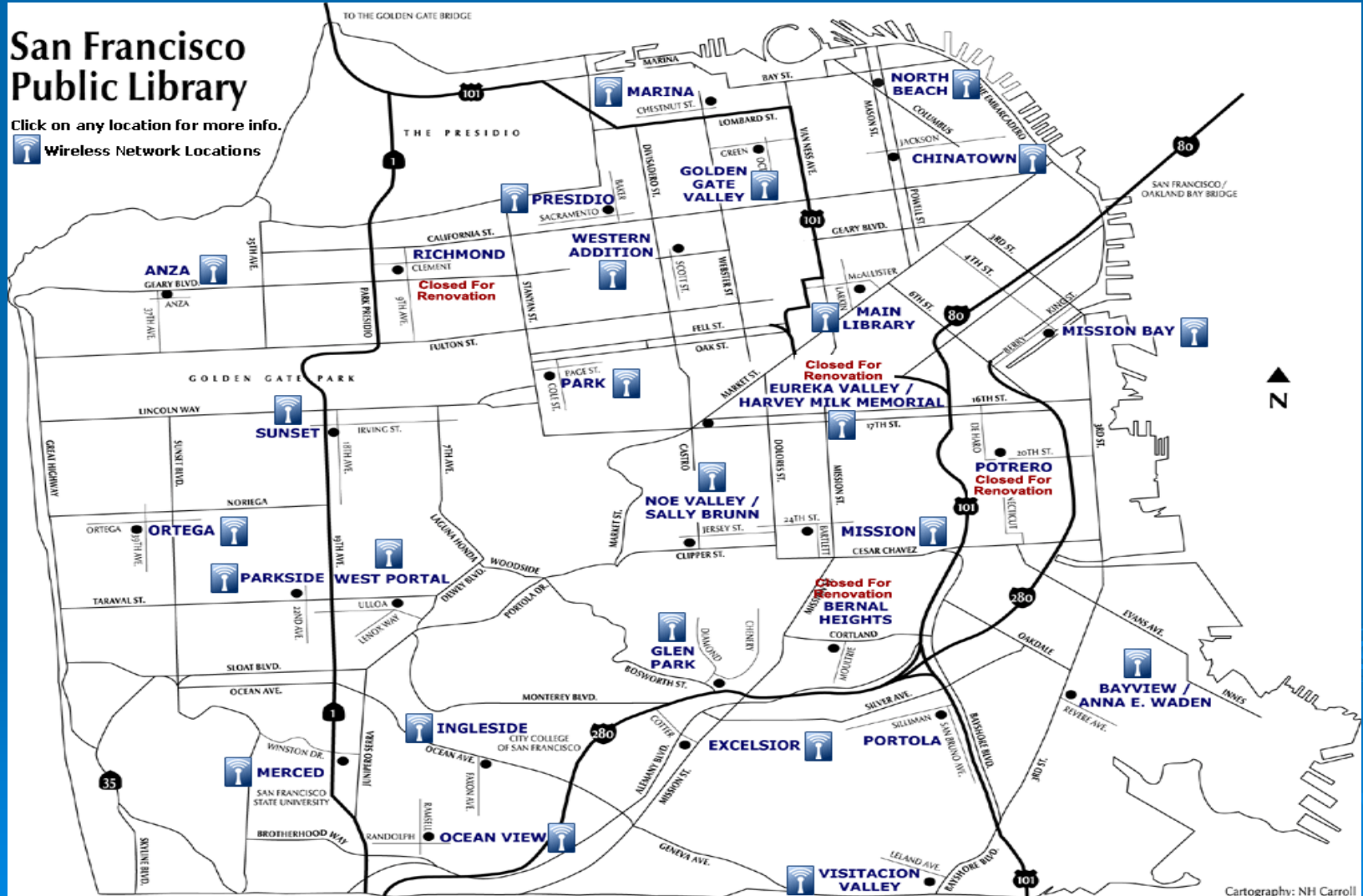
- 8 EMS Receiving Hospitals in City and County of San Francisco
- 2 Standby Receiving Hospitals
- 2 Out-of-County Receiving Hospitals
- 1 Level 1 Trauma Center
- 1 Burn Center with the Trauma Center burn-capable
- 5 adult, 1 pediatric trauma centers in surrounding counties

# Alternate Care Sites

- Community Hubs located at libraries, communications and administration
- Department of Public Health, Community Consortium (Private, non-profit) and Field Care Clinics (18 total sites, 12 fixed, 6 mobile) local pharmaceutical cache
- Casualty Collection Points, designated in geographic zones (11), patient spaces with no medical supplies/equipment

# Field Care Clinics



- Based on DMAT model 50 pts/hr
- 2 medium tents with connector, shower and bathroom facilities
- Generator, HVAC and plumbing systems
- 20 cot capacity

- DMAT CA-6 Bay Area
- CalMat Northern California teams in Bay Area and Sacramento
- Alternate Care Site personnel, supplies and equipment
- Field Hospital(s)



# Austere Care

- Prehospital protocols for special circumstances
- Useful for BLS through MD level providers
- Field and ACS settings
- Workgroup in progress on Alternate Care Sites to expand austere care to fixed facility setting

# Addendum Slide 2

- City Disaster Planning Infrastructure:
  - Department of Emergency Management—senior planning agency, Director reports to the Mayor, coordinates the work of the Department of Public Health, the EMS Agency, Police and Fire Departments
  - Hospital Council Emergency Preparedness Partnership—advisory and information sharing group with health and city agency members
  - Disaster Council—Mayor's advisory group with Board of Supervisors, public and private organization representatives

# Addendum Slide 3

- Hospitals in San Francisco operate at or above capacity as evidenced by a 3 to 20% ambulance diversion rate (status when hospital is not accepting ambulance patients)
- Communications redundancies: phone, fax, satellite phone, internet site, 3 radio frequencies—tested daily
- 2 transplant centers in SF
